

Introduction to drawing Fashion illustrations

- This e-course comes with many drawing and designing techniques and exercises! The course is aimed at anyone with an interest in the fascinating world of fashion. You will learn how to draw fashion figures and draw them professionally.
- Learn how to create a professional looking fashion illustration step by step. Some amazing secrets will be reviled. We will explore the wide range of media that is used in illustrating designs. You will learn how to represent what you see in your creative individual way.
- So why do fashion designers need to know how to draw a proportional female and male figure? The answer is simple. Designers use drawing to communicate their vision with a maximum impact. When a fashion designer creates something it comes as an idea, then the idea needs to be visualised and communicated to the customers or buyers. To communicate all these creative ideas clearly is to draw them.

■ Designers present their creative ideas as three dimensional garments on fashion figures. Can we imagine a garment without a body? Yes, but we won't be able to see how the garment will look on a human body. Later when you create a collection of five outfits, we suggest you to draw five fashion figures on the A3 or A2 paper. We will take you through the techniques used to draw the figure, face, hands and feet. Next step will be to design five outfits and finish the figures as fully stylised rendered fashion illustrations.



- Presentation is very important. You can present your fashion illustration or a collection in many different ways.
- Everything you need to know about drawing fashion illustrations, flats or technical drawings is right here in this e-course! Get all the help, tips, tricks and advice from professional designers! You will be greatly rewarded for your patience and creative work.

The Art shop —drawing tools and paper

- To draw Fashion illustrations you will need to purchase different drawing media-paper, pencils, paints, pastels, pantone markers, art line pens and brushes. So what do you need to draw fashion illustrations? There are so many products available in art shops. It's really easy to get lost there so get some help from the experts.
- You will need A4, A3 and A2 paper. Semitransparent paper —A 3, 80 gsm is the best paper for drawing and tracing but not suitable for watercolour pencils and Pantone markers, because the paper is very light. Buy a bleedproof paper for watercolours and Pantone markers. Artist's Sketch Books feature the finest quality, Australian made, genuine drawing cartridge, which is neutral pH, acid-free and excellent archival stability. With a medium surface, is ideal for pen, pencil, crayon, charcoal, acrylic and watercolour media. Fabriano Accademia Disegno Pads offer a superb surface which is ideal for all dry media. Suitable also for light wet media, such as watercolour pencils and gouache.
- Fashion boards A3 and A2 are used for presenting collections. Colours depend on your collections and ideas.
- Buy a portfolio where you can keep all your art work. Get an art portfolio where you can keep drawing and coloring media together. Choose some portable art box as well.
- Drawing material. Graphite pencils: H, HB, 2B, 6B. H gives a hard line, which is very good to use for technical drawings. HB gives a medium strength line, 2B gives a soft line, 6B gives a very soft line that is great to use for sketching and shading. Derwent Watercolour Pencils feature a smooth 3,5mm colour strip which retains its full intensity whether applied wet or dried. Ideal for mixed media work.

- Derwent Coloursoft pencils are ideal for detailed illustrations. The pencils can be mixed and blended to create rich velvety colours.
- Pantone markers: these markers is a professional media used in the design studio. Pantone marker has 3 felt points -broad, medium and fine (thin). Water based markers can give water-colour effects.
- Copic markers- is a cheaper version of Pantone markers. Copic has two tips, great for rendering skin, hair and fabrics.
- Black ink art-line pens: size 0.1-0.7. Use 0.1 for fine lines, through to 0.7 for bold lines. You will need red, green, black and blue pens. Use fine art-line pen for drawing production/technical drawings. Use colored pens to draw eyes, lips and other small details.
- Colour pastels
- Mounting boards
- Brushes: round no. 1-fine. no. 7-medium, no. 15-thick.







LET'S START

- **Fashion design course** is aimed at anyone with an interest in the fascinating world of Fashion, Style and Design.
- Drawing is an important part of a design process.



- The primary purpose of fashion illustrations is to showcase the clothes.
- There are two kinds of drawings production drawings or technical drawings (also production sketches) and rendered stylised illustrations.
- **Media**. We use different media to draw- pencils, textures, watercolour pencils, paints, gouache, oil pastels and Pantone markers. It is a great idea to mix media to create some masterpieces.



- For example, we may use watercolour pencil on a textured paper, black ink pen with Pantone marker. My favourite is to mix watercolour pencils, Pantone markers and art-line pens.
- Your illustrations should be fun to draw; experiment with media, find your creative way!

I never stop drawing and searching for new ideas. This time I was inspired by the Sound and Light show in Dubai








Geometric analysis of a fashion figure

Draw 10 horizontal lines on A3 paper, 3cm apart. Draw geometric shapes as illustrated.




Drawing a figure

- STEP 1. 9 heads is a system that used to draw a proportional fashion figure.
- You will need an A3 paper, a ruler and a HB pencil.
- Please follow the instructions and the provided illustration to draw a fashion figure.
- Draw 10 lines across the page (3 cm apart). Number lines from 0 to 9.
- Draw a centre line in the middle of a paper. It is a figure's centre line (or spine)
- Line 1- draw a chin.
- Half way down from Line 1- a shoulder line (around 4 5 cm long)
- Draw a head-an oval shape- from Line 0

- Draw a cylinder for the neck
- Line 3 a bellybutton, a waistline line is around 3-3.5 cm
- Above Line 3 a rib cage line
- Join a shoulder line and a rib cage line
- Line 2 undergrms. Below line 2- bust
- Line 4- hips, around 4-5 cm long
- Below Line 3 a hipbone line
- Join a hipbone line and a hip line
- Line 6 knees. Draw 2 circles for knees
- Line 8 ankles. Draw 2 circles for ankles
- Draw legs following the illustration
- Arms- Line 3 -elbows, Line 4 -wrists
- Fingertips- quarter up from knees








- ■1.Draw 10 lines across the page(3 cm apart)
 Number lines from 0 to 9
- ■2. Draw a centre line in the middle of a paper (black line). It is a figure's centre line
- Draw a spine (red line) and follow as illustrated



- This is a geometric drawing or geometric analysis of a fashion figure.
- **Shape the figure!** Now you need to shape the figure, giving her soft and feminine lines.

Face

- You will need an A3 paper, a ruler and a HB pencil.
- Draw a box 5 X 7 cm and a smaller one 2.5 X 3 cm.
- Draw centre lines. Draw a chin and a head inside the boxes.
- Plan where you want to draw eyes. First line- an eye line, then eye lids and under eye lines.
- Draw pupils, eye balls. Leave an area inside the eyes unrendered- it's a light reflection which makes eyes bright and sparkly.
- Lips and nose- follow the illustrations.
- Hair- practice drawing different hair styles. Draw straight, curly ,wavy, short and long hair. Decide which hair style you will draw on your fashion figure.




- STEP 2. Draw face and hair on the figure.
- Your fashion figure looks great. Put it aside for a while.
- <u>STEP 3.</u> Design an outfit for your fashion figure. Now starts the designing process! It's a very interesting and creative time that you need to spend on finding inspiration and designing a collection.
- You can find inspiration everywhere- nature (ocean, stars in the sky, flowers, drops of water); fabric stores (lace, texture, colour); fashion shows; movies and TV shows, and architecture.
- You will need a couple of pages of A3 paper and a pencil. Draw 5-10 designs and choose the best one.



- **STEP 4. Draw an outfit on your fashion figure.** You need only a HB pencil in this exercise.
- Draw an outfit or a garment on your fashion figure, ignoring all other lines. This drawing will be a little bit messy, that is ok ©
- Now you have a chance to add accessories like jewellery, hats, bags and shoes.
- STEP 5. Tracing the figure. Next step is tracing the figure. You will need a clean piece of A3 paper and a sharp pencil. Put a clean paper on top of your fashion figure and trace it. Trace only lines that you need to render, don't push pencil very hard. You want light tracing lines that will be easy to render later.
- <u>STEP 6.</u> Rendering the illustration. To render the illustration, start from the face and hair, then skin and an outfit. Finally, render all accessories and outline the illustration if you need.
- STEP 7. Mounting your fashion illustration. We use mounting technique to mount the picture. Black cardboard is used for mounting.







How to draw hair

- Look at the pictures in a magazine and choose the desired hair style. Identify the major sections of hair. Lightly outline the main shapes (curles, waves) and sections.
- Draw in the dark parts with a soft pencil, but leave the highlights so hair will look like real.
- Make sure that you follow the direction of the curls or waves.















Rendering

- Rendering clothes is a challenge for many artists, because clothes is made of different fabrics and trims. The important thing is to understand how shadow and movement affects the garment shape, how it sits or flows from the body. You have to observe how different fabric works.
- 1)Shading- use a straightforward side-to-side shading motion, try to build a smooth even layer of colour
- 2) Hatching- rapid, regular and evenly spaced lines on a paper
- 3)Cross-hatching- hatching overlaid at right angles. You can use different colours
- 4)Scumbling-use circles to draw and overlap each other
- 5)Directional marks- short directional lines which follow a contour (hair , fur)
- 6)Burnishing-layers of colored pencil overlaid using strong pressure to achieve a smooth result










